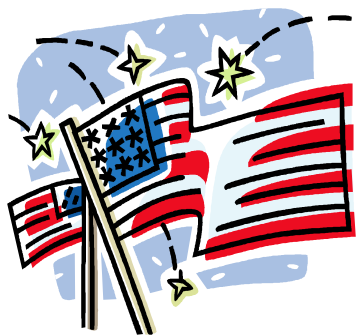

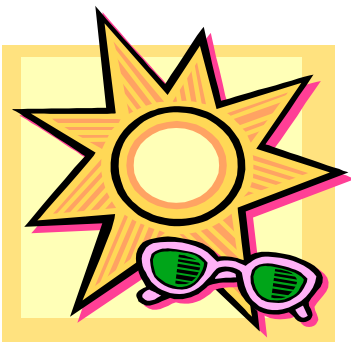

Tips to Insure Kindergarten Success:

- Read to your child each day. Remember to move your fingers with the words as you read them when reading a story. This helps teach left → right progression.
- Allow your children to see you read and write.
- Always have many and varied art and writing supplies including scissors, glue, glue stick and stapler for your child to explore and create with.
- When preparing a meal, cut a fruit or vegetable in half, thirds, or quarters and talk about how it makes a whole.
- Teach your child to always use the magic words “please” and “thank you.”
- Encourage your child to use words, not force, when angry.
- Explain that good manners help people get along with each other.
- Ask questions that begin with who, what, when, where and why.
- Give your child simple tasks that involve sorting and counting objects (socks, towels, silverware).
- Praise your child when you see him sharing, helping or being kind.
- Have your child make choices. Making choices builds independence and confidence.
- Practice writing first and last name frequently.
